hanks to an engineering program, students are learning to be innovative and creative. Accurately titled "Engineering Challenge," the group has met after school for the past seven months, on the last Thursday of each month. They are given 45 minutes to design and accomplish a goal with the materials given.

Chemistry teacher and engineering challenge advisor Natalie Munn said, "[We are trying] to provide students a different type of academic competition, other than science fair, and to promote engineering."

Challenges this year included noise-reducing headphones, a broom to sweep up cat litter, a hanging and try it out, or come every chandelier, and a box with as many latches as possible to hold M&Ms.

Senior and overall girls' winner Willow Wunsch commented on the challenges given. She said, "I liked the spontaneity of just walking into the room and being presented with random materials and a goal. It was fun having to think on my feet and compete against other students."

Senior Tim Roberts, the overall boys' winner, said, "I think I am going to study engineering in college, and this was a fun and engaging way to start preparing for it."

About 40 people participate overall, 20 of whom are regulars; some only come once or twice, in between sports or other clubs. "It's nice," Dr. Munn said, "because students have the flexibility to come once time to compete and win awards."

Tim added, "The

challenges provide an exciting way to get some experience not only with engineering, but also with working as a team, which is always important later in life."

The final challenge took place on April 9, where the winners of the overall challenge were announced. Tim Roberts won for the boys, and Willow Wunsch was the girls' winner. Eli Hanschka and Elizabeth O'Brien were in second place, followed by Christopher Aring, Zachary Bresnick, Connor Downing, Russell Shapiro, Maddy Moore, and Ellie Reagan in third place, and Kevin Montambault and Emily Moore with honorable mentions.

Dr. Munn added, "It diversifies experiences in science that students aren't normally offered, and helps them connect with other like-minded students while working in small groups toward a single goal." HSV
