Superintendent retires after decade of service

ames Weiss will be retiring in June after 10 U years as the superintendent of Martha's Vineyard Public Schools.

Previously, Dr. Weiss worked as a superintendent in two districts in New Hampshire during the course of 16 years. However, his love of beaches and the Island community convinced him it was time for a change. He went on to take a job as superintendent on Martha's Vineyard. Ultimately, he has dedicated about 46 years of his life to education.

Dr. Weiss has worked hard to make Island schools more accommodating and progressive. Dr. Weiss commented on several of his accomplishments as the superintendent: "I am proud of many developments, including the eighth grade honors algebra program and the vocational program for nursing assistants at the high school and working with the broader Island community, which is so supportive, to help get the YMCA built. 
