The Business of Baseball at Fenway Park



On November 12th, a group of business students traveled to the EMC Club at Fenway Park for an event called "The Business of Baseball" sponsored by Babson College. A dozen of my Sports Management students traveled to Boston along with Dan Sharkovitz and myself.

The event gave us a chance to experience a short private tour of Fenway where we sat in the Press Box, passed Fenway Farms (a new sustainable garden atop the stadium), and got to take in the view from the Green Monster seats before returning to the EMC Club for the main presentation by team President, Sam Kennedy. Mr. Kennedy spoke about the economics of running the team - one part of parent company Fenway







Sports Group - which also includes an 80% stake in NESN, a 50% stake in Rousch Fenway Racing (NASCAR), and 100% ownership of Fenway Sports Management (Sports Agency) and 100% ownership of the Liverpool soccer team. He spoke to the complexity of running all those areas and talked about being lucky enough to have had good mentors.


He was a very engaging speaker and *Te* his message was well received by our students.

Next came an interesting presentation about analytics delivered by a Babson professor of Statistics and Entrepreneurship Elaine Allen who has done consulting work for MLB and a few individual teams. She highlighted statistical findings in some interesting situations: performance in a contract year vs. a non-contract year, DL time for certain players vs. winning percentage, and Grady Little getting fired in 2003 for leaving Pedro in too long in Game 7. Both speakers highlighted the increasing use of stats both on the field and in making informed business decisions such as FSG putting on a concert series or exploring other revenue streams. A few of my students remarked that they were interested in this pursuit.

Finally, and most importantly for my business students, we attended a networking reception at the end of the event. Though we were the only high school group in attendance, many of the students went up to someone in the crowd (small group of Babson students, mostly alums) introduced themselves, and struck up a conversation - a live lesson in networking. Then we traveled back to Falmouth for an overnighter, stopping to have a team dinner at Outback. Though the venue was nice, the experiential learning was nicer.

Congratulations to our MVRHS art students who attended Portfolio Day Boston at the Hynes Center on Sunday, November 1st! This is a yearly event in which over 50 art and design schools convene in Boston to review the portfolios of art students from all over New England.

This year, in addition to students already taking the Portfolio class, there were 11 MVRHS students (juniors and seniors) that attended. All students spent extra time during the weeks leading up to the event, both after school and the Saturday before, preparing and refining their artwork for presentation.

In a crowd of 2800, spread over 3 large ballrooms, they stood in line with their peers to show their portfolios, receiving feedback and criticism from school representatives. For most, this was the first time showing a full body of work to strangers. The hard work they put in produced a valuable experience and all said they would recommend it to a friend.



Honors Portuguese Students Have Been Busy!

On November 17th, the Honors Portuguese 4 and Brazilian History class went on a field trip to the New Bedford Whaling museum where we made many *lusophone* (pertaining to the Portuguese language) cultural connections to the New Bedford area and learned a lot about whaling. The museum surpassed our expectations in

many ways and we all seemed to make personal connections to the stories told. The students most enjoyed the half-size replica of a real whaling ship built inside of the museum that students were able to board and explore.



After our morning at the museum and an enormous Portuguese lunch at the famous Antonio's Restaurant in New Bedford, we spent the afternoon taking a tour of the UMass Dartmouth campus which for most students was their first tour of a college campus. We saw everything from the library, to the million dollar dummies the nursing



students use for hands-on practice, to the dinning hall and dorm rooms. We saw club flyers and study abroad opportunities specifically geared toward Portuguese-speakers. We were invited by the Portuguese faculty to a round-table question and answer opportunity for our students to find out more about their program for heritage speakers and to hear from a few of their current students about what they plan to do with their major or minor in Portuguese. We found out that currently in their program they have many Portuguese, Cape Verdean, and Azorean Portuguese speakers but do not have any Brazilian Portuguese speakers. All of our students were encouraged to apply to UMass.

Lastly, we actually attended and participated in Professora Reis' Portuguese for Heritage speakers class. MVRHS students were mixed with UMass students and had to complete the assignment together. For those of us who could hear it, it was truly a beautiful mix of Portuguese accents and as the individual conversations developed the common connections between language, culture, and how we all ended up in New England inevitably emerged. Overall, it was a most-meaningful and educational experience for both students and teachers and we hope to do it again in the future.

Business Department Starts Local DECA Chapter

The Business department has started a local DECA chapter. DECA stands for Distributed Education Clubs of America. DECA is an international organization for high school and college students enrolled in business and/or

marketing classes. The group is the only student organization, which prepares its members to be future leaders in the fields of marketing, management, finance, hospitality and entrepreneurship. DECA operates through local business education programs and gives students the opportunity to compete with other DECA members from across the country in categories such as advertising, marketing, retail merchandising, food marketing, restaurant management, entrepreneurship, and finance and credit. These competitions take place at district, state, and international conferences during the course of the school year. There are four main points, represented by the DECA diamond, which are emphasized in DECA. They include leadership development, civic consciousness, social intelligence, and vocational understanding.

On October 21st, four students traveled to the MA DECA Fall State Leadership Conference at Bentley University: Karn Datta, Krishna Datta, Wyatt Jenkinson and Jack Reagan. They attended a leadership academy in the morning and several afternoon workshops on topics such as entrepreneurship, running for state office, and dressing for success. A week later, the MA DECA Coordinator and two students, both freshmen at Johnson & Wales University, visited MVRHS. They told us about their high school experience and all the opportunities DECA could offer our program. They also acted out a role play in the hospitality industry. We're looking forward to getting involved with DECA this winter and gearing up for our first possible district level competition in January.

The November Engineering Challenge

Each month, our students have the opportunity to compete in our after-school Engineering Challenge competition. The goals of the Challenge include:

1) providing students an opportunity to experience authentically and firsthand the process of engineering as they work as engineers to complete a design challenge

2) providing students an opportunity to work as a group to collaborate and communicate to achieve a common goal

3) providing students an opportunity to compete as an academic team in a different type of competition than our yearly science fair, thus expanding the opportunities for students to gain recognition for their accomplishments in science and related STEAM disciplines.

The **November Challenge** was to **create a grocery grabber**. Students were given 45 minutes to construct a twofoot grabber that could reach small food items that were either high on a shelf or far across a table. The groups were provided cardboard, wood materials such as dowels and popsicle sticks, bolts and screws, netting, and plastic bubble wrap. To test the grabbers, each group had a representative team member grab six separate items and put them in a mini "shopping cart" without dropping or touching the items. The items included a box of tea, a box of cake, a spice jar, an apple, a clementine, and a sweet potato. The group that completed the task fastest was named the winner.
