## **Summer Reading Assignment**

As you read, please take brief notes on some of the following concepts, for the purpose of organizing some of your thinking about what you read. We also want to help prepare you to go beyond mere summary when writing an essay on your book during the first week of class. You will be asked to turn in your notes on Day 1 - no more than 2 pages (so be discerning about what you choose to record) — and you *will* be allowed to use your notes during the in-class essay assignment.

If you select a work of FICTION, pay attention to some of the following:

- ★ Overall: What stood out to you? What did you notice?
- ★ The main character: What are the main character's most noteworthy traits? How does the main character change or evolve over the course of the book, and why? In what ways are these traits beneficial or detrimental to this change?
- ★ The central conflict: With what is your character struggling? What is the biggest challenge they face? What additional conflicts arise? Note their victories and defeats, and what these outcomes tell us about who they are and the circumstances in which they find themselves.
- ★ External influences: To what extent does time, place, society, politics, race, class, gender, culture, and/or religion impact your character's circumstances? To what extent do any of these influences shape who they are or who they become as a person over the course of the novel?
- ★ Central theme(s): What is the central message (or two) at the heart of the novel? How do you know this to be true?

If you select a work of <u>NONFICTION</u>, pay attention to some of the following:

- ★ Overall: What stood out to you? What did you notice?
- ★ The central argument: In one or two sentences, what is the central point the author is trying to make in this work?
- ★ Relevance: Who is the primary audience for this book? What are the central messages in the book? What might a reader gain from reading this? How is what you're learning about in this book relevant to young people, either in general or at this particular point in history? In your opinion, what are the three most important insights you might share with your classmates?
- ★ Evidence and Reasoning: What types of evidence does the author put forth? (Note some compelling facts, statistics, research studies, stories, eyewitness accounts, primary sources, comparisons, etc.) In your opinion, what is the most convincing evidence, and why?
- ★ **Purpose**: Why did the author choose to write this book? What convinced him/her/them to begin this research/tell this story?
